Minnesota Justice Research Center's 2020 Re-Imagining Justice Conference Paves Path To Transform Minnesota's Criminal Justice System

Governor Tim Walz and Professor john a. powell keynote conference; MNJRC founder and former Hennepin County Attorney Tom Johnson honored

Roseville, Minnesota: The Minnesota Justice Research Center held its annual Re-Imagining Justice Conference last week, bringing together criminal justice practitioners, legal experts, scholars, law enforcement, and advocates to re-imagine a justice system that functions more effectively, humanely, and with the public's trust. This year's conference included six plenary sessions and eight breakout panels, centering powerful conversations to identify the path forward to transform Minnesota's justice system.

Day one included Minnesota Governor Tim Walz who spoke to the importance of continuing to perfect the justice system so that it

Tom passed away in June 2020 after a six-year battle with cancer. Tom dedicated his life to addressing racial disparities in the criminal justice system. "MNJRC is just one of many legacies that Tom left behind," said Mark Haase, MNJRC Board Member. "We are grateful for his commitment to this work and will continue to carry it on as we keep working to transform our justice system."

"Recent events in our state -- indeed, the nation as a whole -- lay bare the racial disparities in our society. There is an urgent need to wrestle with the reality we're facing, put a human face on the data, and design reforms with impacted communities at the center," said Justin Terrell, MNJRC's Executive Director.

Sharon Sayles Belton, , and MNJRC Board Member explained, "the killing of George Floyd has sparked outrage and movements for justice around the world. It's time now for Minnesota to move from being a spark for outrage to becoming an example for meaningful transformation of our justice system to become one that is more humane and holds the trust of the community."

"This year's Re-Imagining Justice Conference will be a place where people with different perspectives will come together to expand the ideas of what is possible," Tom Heffelfinger, former U.S. Attorney and MNJRC Board Member.
